

### From the Pastor's Desk

Into the Unknown

In the Disney animated movie Frozen 2, there's a scene near the beginning of the story where one of the main characters, Elsa, sings a song entitled "Into the Unknown." Those who saw the first movie know that Elsa's previous "happy ending" included becoming the queen of her kingdom and living in her castle with her sister and close friends. The words that Elsa sings in this song, however, make it quickly apparent that she's feeling restless and unsatisfied; she's struggling with where her life is supposed to go next. That struggle establishes the premise of the rest of the movie and drives the story as Elsa and her friend journey forward into their unknown futures.

That song gets stuck in my head every time I hear it, but it also seems to serve as an appropriate theme song for my family at this stage in our lives. At the time of this writing, I'm sitting in my church office in Beaufort surrounded by half-packed boxes and wrestling with a mixture of excitement and nervousness. The scene at my home with my wife and kids is pretty similar. My daughter is probably the only one of us willing to sing "Into the Unknown" out loud, but all four of us are wondering what God has in store for us as we prepare to move to Pendleton- our currently unknown future.

By the time you read this, my family will already be getting settled into the church parsonage, but I suspect that we'll still be dealing with many of the emotions that come with transitioning into a new place. I also suspect that many of you are experiencing your own strange combination of conflicting emotions. Perhaps you're curious and excited to meet my family. Perhaps you're concerned as to how my preaching and ministry style will differ from the pastors who came before me. Perhaps you're disturbed (or delighted) that your new pastor is willing to make a reference to a "children's movie" in the church newsletter. You're most certainly wondering what God has in store for this new chapter in the life and ministry of the church.

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#### **TEN3 Ministries**

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On May 29, Jim and Karen Szymanski visited Pendleton United Methodist Church to give presentations during the worship and Sunday school hours about the ministry they work with to spread the Gospel in Nigeria, Tanzania, and Zambia. In particular, the Transformational Education Network—3rd generation (TEN3) ministry seeks to reach the younger generations in these countries. For over twenty years, TEN3 has used training individuals in computer literacy as a method of reaching people for Christ. Jim and Karen have worked hard from their home base in Houghton, NY, to supply the computers needed for the training.

Even before their current support activities in the U.S., Jim and Karen spent 13 years as missionaries in Nigeria. Some of those years were difficult because of the rising violence against Christians by radical Islamic groups such as Boko Haram and the Fulani tribesmen. These groups have burned churches, murdered church members and pastors, and destroyed Christian-majority villages. Many assaults were surprise attacks at night. The government has made little effort to protect them. In order to ensure their safety, Jim and Karen were recalled.

Since then, they have traveled around to churches seeking PC laptop computers no longer in use by their owners. These donated laptops are outfitted to be used by mobile computer training outreach teams. The teams take about 20 laptops at a time with a mobile generator into areas of the three countries with no electricity. To prepare the laptops for use by the mobile teams, donated laptops are completely wiped of their current data and operating system, and the Linux operating system is installed. The interest of many Africans to become computer literate is a strong draw for the mobile teams and an open door to present the Good News of Jesus Christ.

If you have a PC laptop you no longer use (no Apple products are used because they cannot run Linux), you can donate it to TEN3 anytime. The battery does not have to be in good condition, but they will need the power cord. To donate your computer, please call George Atkinson (864-506-1173), and he will be glad to pick it up and get it shipped to Jim and Karen, who in turn will have the hard drive wiped and shipped to TEN3 in Africa. Laptops are constantly needed to keep all the mobile teams active. This is a unique ministry that imparts a usable skill along with the incomparable gift of eternal life in Christ. What a great ministry to join with your gift.

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### **PARSONAGES**

Where do pastors' families live? The pastor of Pendleton United Methodist Church has lived in a church-furnished house called a parsonage since the late 1800s. It has not been the same house, but the parsonage committee has worked to provide a clean comfortable house for their pastor.

Very early ministers were circuit riders. They traveled by horseback all week long to the various churches on their circuit. They stayed with church members during the week and when the circuit was finished, they traveled to their home to see their family and get fresh clothes. From 1873 to 1875 the Rev. John Finger served the circuit and lived on Highway 88.


The first record of a parsonage owned by the church was the house in the northwest corner where Mechanic Street crosses Main Street. This was purchased from Mrs. David Taylor, daughter of Zacheria Taliaferro, and a charter member of this church. Past records show in the 1887 quarterly conference the house and church building were valued at \$1,100.00. Later this house was sold, and a lot on the south side of Queen Street was purchased.



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On this spacious lot, a very comfortable and substantial building was built as a home for the Methodist ministers of this Charge. Many pastors and families passed in and out the threshold there for a period of sixty-five years. This home was furnished and maintained by the members of the various churches of the Charge. A bathroom and equipment were installed in 1935 in the parsonage at a cost of \$465.00.

Shortly after Pendleton Church became a station church (a church that has its own pastor) the idea arose that a new parsonage should be built. In 1959 the building on Queen Street was sold, and a more modern brick home was erected. This parsonage was built on a lot that was willed to Pendleton Methodist Church by Mrs. J. W. Newton. The location was on the corner of Crenshaw and Greenville Street.



This information is in the 1834-1964 History of Pendleton Methodist Church written by Mrs. A, W, Hall, Mrs. W. M. Crenshaw, and Mrs. O. C. Foster. The new parsonage information is also found in the Archives Closet.

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
### "Let me tell you 'bout my Jesus" by April Haynes
